Reflections on a wedding day in church

(Since this is my swansong, it seems appropriate in a movement that is for married couples and run by married couples to ponder a little on sacramental marriage)

Seamus Heaney, in an interview shortly before he died, said “the biggest shift in my lifetime has been the evaporation of the transcendent from all our discourse and our sense of human destiny”. (Transcendent meaning an unselfconscious acceptance of the reality of God) – an observation we easily resonate with in the politically correct climate of Irish society today, where the mention of God or religious faith often is a source of religious embarrassment. However, for the Christian to say that God or the Gospel is not relevant to 21st century life is absurd, as God is the source of all relevance.

Thomas Merton, the American Cistercian author wrote: ‘If you want to identify me, do not ask me superficial questions like where do I live, or who do I know, or how much money do I earn – but ask me what I am living for, in detail, and ask me what prevents me from living fully for what I want to live for.’ There are certain moments or days in our lives when we know with some clarity what we are living for – and a wedding day is one!

What is the secret of a happy marriage? As any married couple will certainly say: there is no easy or single answer to this question. The commitment, the covenant made to one another publicly on the day of a Christian marriage will have to be worked out in the days and years ahead. It is all part of the great adventure. In the words of Patrick Kavanagh: ‘To be dead is to stop believing in the master pieces we will begin tomorrow.’ Setting out on the journey of committed Catholic Christian married life is to start on a masterpiece that will take a lifetime to complete, in which God through His Spirit in Christ is profoundly involved, an abiding providential presence.

Some time ago in Celtic Tiger Ireland a poet/philosopher writing in the Irish Times was reflecting on contemporary Ireland – an Ireland which he felt was in growing need of spirituality – which he defined as the call for meaning, integration, healing and belonging. I think this is not a bad template for a healthy and happy marriage. We live in post Celtic-Tiger Ireland, but the same qualities are surely called for. The world aches for integrity, for commitment, for faithfulness – qualities often remarkable for their absence in our Western world. As St Augustine of Hippo says: ‘Right is right even if no one is doing it; wrong is wrong even if everyone is doing it!’

Why not have the wedding in registry office? It is enough for the State – but not enough for committed Christians. In a purely civil ceremony there would be, needless to say, no prayers, no readings from Scripture, no Eucharist, indeed no religious symbols of any kind. By contrast, in the ceremony of Catholic marriage the commitment of integrity and faithfulness is made ‘in the Lord’, in the community of the Church, as Christians have been doing down through the centuries, and as so many of our parents did – seeking God’s blessing and Christ’s promised constant presence in their lives – a presence always guaranteed but only glimpsed from time to time, and normally experienced in the knowing we call faith.

A couple in committed love have already experience considerable faith with a small ‘f’ in each other, and found the treasure in the field of the person they want to spend the rest of their lives with. On the wedding day, in a qualitative change from simply being or living together, they have come to this profound and solemn moment when they are consecrating that commitment in faith with a large ‘F’, as they confer the sacrament of matrimony on each other before God, and in the presence of the community of the Church.

A text often chosen for the wedding Mass is the famous passage in I Corinthians 13 where St Paul spells out the meaning of Christian love to the people of Corinth, describing what he calls “the best way of all”.

The word he uses in Greek for love is agape – the love that God has for us that is unconditional and does not look for a return. But this love, as Paul says, that is patient and kind, never jealous or rude, that does not insist on its own way and rejoices in the right; the love that believes and hopes and endures everything, the love that never ends – this love is not something that any couple create and fashion from their own natural and many obvious talents: this kind of love is a gift of God, poured into their hearts specifically in the sacrament of matrimony as a goal, an ideal towards which they are called. The message is clear: God loves you; God lives in you; God unites your love for each other to His, unites it to the unselfish love that led Him to give His own Son to the Cross for you. This love is a gift – we may not demand it; we do not deserve it; we cannot buy it. God gives it out of His sheer goodness, and it is His pledge that through the years that lie ahead this couple need never be alone, and that their love can indeed by endless, can endure all things if they are not simply two but three – God Himself being the third – if their own wonderful love for each other is carefully, caringly cradled in God's own love.

St John of the Cross, the 16th century Carmelite, wrote famously that in the evening of our lives we will be judged on love. This love, this Christian married love, often stumbling, always imperfect, nonetheless is unconditional, it relativizes all other relationships in life, it seeks to order them without compromise and without ambiguity in a culture of relationships that is redolent with compromise and ambiguity and unhappiness – this Christian married love is the same as God's love for us, the source of all happiness. But of course, as we well know it is a costly love.

The bar is indeed high, the measure sought for by disciples of Christ. Christian marriage is not for the immature or self-centred. Nor is it for the 'perfect' or the flaw-free. But it is for humble realists. I have often asked myself what is the function of a homily at a wedding: hardly to give advice about living a married life – there will be plenty of that from parents and experienced friends. But it is, I think, to point to the context of marriage 'in the Church' – the community that has 2000 years of experience, and has something very definite to say. The sacrament of marriage – a sacrament being a sign with a God-charged meaning, accessible only in faith – which the couple confer on each other, despite all the preparations and frenetic surrounds, is remarkably simple: the exchange of vows – their word; the exchange of rings – the sign and symbol of commitment to that word – only possible with the grace of God, offered on this day. The whole context, of course, is one of faith. Rahner defined religion as 'the dimension of depth in all human experience.'

The stakes are high, as with anything really worthwhile, but I think many couples today will not settle for less – and we who are invited to be present at a Christian wedding are invited, not simply as friendly spectators, but as active witnesses in faith, committing ourselves to the support of the couple in the journey ahead in the years to come – to help them work on their masterpieces.

September 18, 2021 will be the 25th anniversary of the death of Father Henri Caffarel. Edgardo and Clarita Bernal, Responsible Couple for the International Leading Team and members of the International Leading team asked the Association of the Friends of Father Caffarel to prepare an audio-visual novena of prayer, to celebrate this anniversary and honour the memory of Father Henri Caffarel. This novena is for the benefit of Teams of Our Lady members, Intercessors, members of the Fraternité de Notre-Dame de la Résurrection (Fraternity of Our Lady of the Resurrection) and members of the Association of the Friends of Father Caffarel from around the world.

FATHER CAFFAREL, A COMPANION ON OUR WAY TOWARDS GOD
“BUT LOVE IS MY ESSENCE”

This will be the title of this novena. Let us remember that a novena consists of praying for nine consecutive days, generally to entrust God with an intention or to ask for a particular grace. **This novena will take place from September 10 to 18, 2021.** Each day a video will be published on the ERI website, with a link to the Friends of Father Caffarel website. This daily video will include an audio or video extract of Father Caffarel and a clip, followed by a prayer and a prayer intention. It will conclude with the Magnificat and the Prayer for the canonisation of Father Caffarel. The day before the first day of the Novena, September 9, 2021, an opening video will be published on the International Leading Team’s website.

The Novena will be presented in the five official languages of Teams of Our Lady: French, English, Spanish, Italian, Portuguese. Each person or couple can pray this novena at a time of day that suits them in communion with all the other participants.

This novena is an opportunity to pray in communion with one another around the figure of Father Henri Caffarel in an expression of thanksgiving. In partnership with your Super-Regional leaders, we trust you will ensure that the necessary information about this novena is broadly communicated, using all the means which seem appropriate to you, in order to incite the greatest number of Teams of Our Lady and members of the Friends of Father Caffarel to pray this novena. This endeavour and your help in making it widely known will clearly form part of the work undertaken by our Association to support the cause of canonisation currently underway in Rome.
