There was a wholehearted response from Teams around Ireland to the invitation to join the Synodal Process.

During the process, our vocabulary was expanded, we quickly realised that 'Synodality' and a phrase we know well in Teams 'Collegiality', are synonymous. They describe collaboration and mutual listening where we all have something to learn. In the Autumn of last year, members studied and considered the synod themes in a prayerful way, gathering on Zoom or in our Teams, to share our thoughts and listen to others share theirs. We considered how we are journeying together and what steps the Spirit invites us to take to grow in our journeying together. In the Spring a group of facilitators carried out the important task of listening and collecting the deliberations from the Zoom meetings.

The next task was to draw together a Drafting Team to prayerfully review all the submissions, seek the common trends, hear the prophetic voices and together through a series of prayerful meetings, draft a synthesis. This final draft synthesis, together with the anonymised submissions, was objectively reviewed for any necessary corrections. The synthesis was forwarded to:

- The Teams' Super-Regional Couple, Paul and Annette O'Beirne. From here it will be sent on to the International Leading Team – ERI. The ERI will collate the Teams of Our Lady submissions from around the world and forward them to the Holy See.
- Irish Synodal Task Group.
As the Irish Church is conducting her own synodal process concurrently, the contribution from Teams of Our Lady Ireland will be added to the synthesis received from Lay Ecclesial Movements, Associations and Groups from all over Ireland for onward submission to the Holy See in August 2022.

Celebrating the team meeting

As the evaluation meeting approaches, it is timely to take stock of the journey we have made with our Team this year.

In the ERI letter of March 2022 we were treated to a reflection on the team meeting as a celebration

"The monthly meeting of a team should not only be defined by its structure, its spirit, the friendship of its members, or the desire for it to be a stage in their search for God. It must first of all recognise its supernatural substance and its mystery....in the middle of the room where these couples are gathered, there is the intense presence of the Risen Lord, alive, attentive to all, loving each one as he is, with his virtues and weaknesses, and ready to help them become what he wants them to be".

These sentiments also evoke the moment when Thomas placed his hand in the wounded side of Jesus. Like Thomas with his questions, how often have we come to the Team meeting discouraged or disorientated, only to experience Jesus' loving glance mysteriously renew us. In sharing our prayer, pooling, scripture

and study with our brothers and sisters, we find our single fish or broken loaf becomes enough to satisfy each of our needs and send us home revitalised.

This is what Fr Caffarel called “...meeting on the level of your souls, in the name of Christ, in Christ. The temptation is often very great to remain only at the level of human friendship... How many, even amongst the best, spend their whole life without experiencing this intimacy in Christ: they share everything, everything except what is most precious, their life with Christ.”

We celebrate these meetings where, in our heart to heart journeying together, we encounter Jesus.

Let us not keep this great gift a secret but pray the grace of Pentecost will embolden and inspire us to find ways to share it this Summer!

We wish you rest and renewal in the Lord, until we meet on these pages again.

From The Regional Chaplain, Fr. Richard Sheehy



Earlier this week, I celebrated graduation Masses for school leavers from two different secondary schools. These celebrations recognise in ritual form the need to acknowledge both the sadness of leaving one stage of life behind and anxiety concerning an uncertain future, before one can be open to the gift that the new beginning represents. The experience of having successfully negotiated previous transitions in life, and trust in God's grace, helps one to move forward with hope.

Today, Ascension Sunday, marks the bridge between Easter and Pentecost and highlights the significance of in-between times, which enable us to prepare for change or to give space for a situation to evolve, just as the apostles waited patiently, if anxiously, in the upper room to be empowered for mission.

Since late last year the Church in Ireland, as across the world and at the invitation of Pope Francis, has been engaged in the Synodal Pathway: a 'listening exercise' in preparation for a Synod in Rome in October 2023. As well as individual parishes across the country, lay movements, like Teams of Our Lady, were invited to participate and to conduct their own listening exercise among their members, responding to the same set of specific questions.

Although I did not participate myself, my understanding is that the Teams process involved two Zoom gatherings in January/February which involved around 45 participants from across the Region. Following this a drafting team of couples drawn from across the Region drafted a document for submission to the Teams Super-Region. Many of the points raised reflect similar themes that emerged at parish Synodal gatherings, such as the need for the Church to listen more to the experience of the lay faithful, the need for catechesis in order to empower people for lay ministry and co-responsibility with clergy, concern about how the parish can effectively engage with young people and reach out to those who have become disaffected. It was also pointed out that involvement with lay movements such as Teams, strengthen a sense of belonging in the Church and that Teams provides a good model of listening, since a good part of our meetings involves listening actively to one another.

One practical suggestion that impressed me was that the practice of the Endeavours be somehow shared with the wider Church. It reminded me yet again that the Endeavours are at the core of what Teams is about. I love the word itself: it's not about rules but practices that we encourage one another to do so that we grow in faith and in openness to God and to one another. We may not manage to do all six endeavours (individual prayer, couple prayer, sit-down, scripture reading, rule of life and annual retreat) all the time, but the fact that we keep trying is what makes the difference to the quality of our development as an individual, as a couple and as a Team. Perhaps, rather than waiting for couples to join Teams, we can already find ways of encouraging them to begin practising one or other of these endeavours and discover

the difference it can make.

Speaking of endeavours, it was great to see the turnout at the recent day retreat at Avila organised by the Dublin sector. For some, including couples from our first 'Zoom' team, it was the first time to attend in person a Teams' event. The retreat was given by Fr. Liam Finnerty OCD who based his reflections on love and marriage from the writings of the Carmelite mystic, John of the Cross. Because of First Communion commitments, I only managed to attend the afternoon session, but one of his many quotes which stays with me is that, '*Christ became human in order to reveal the beauty in God's eyes of the human person*'. Food for thought and prayer!

As we approach Pentecost, let us pray for a fresh outpouring of God's Spirit on our Church and on Teams of Our Lady in particular. May we always seek to live out and share the fruits of what we ourselves receive from Teams.

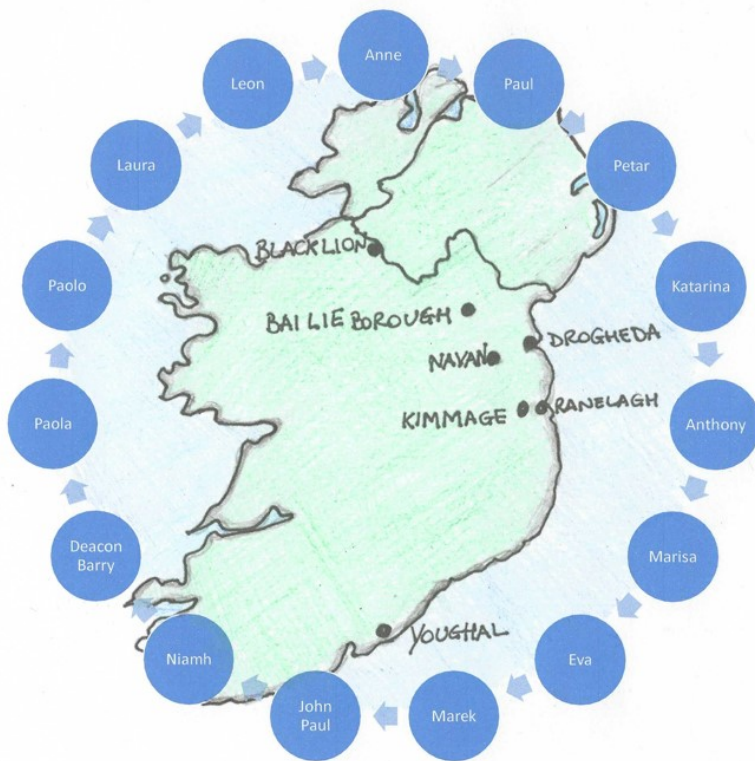

Introduction to Teams by ZOOM: nurturing seeds across Ireland



The Irish movement has promoted a new initiative - Introduction to Teams by ZOOM - with the aim of reaching out to Christian married couples who live in areas of the country where it is currently difficult to join a face-to-face team.

Seven couples spread out across Ireland feel blessed by the gift of Teams and the spiritual guidance of Deacon Barry. The international vibe is a special blessing, as members come from Croatia, Italy, South Africa, Slovak Republic and Ireland, of course. *"We met couples from all over the country and despite being a virtual meeting, a really strong bond developed between us, until we could have the opportunity to meet in person."*

This initiative seems to have turned one of the main challenges of Covid times – meeting in ZOOM – into a new way of evangelization. *"We first joined Teams*

during covid lockdown, when zoom meetings were the only option. We found the fellowship with other couples an incredible support, especially at a stage in our lives where we were both physically and emotionally isolated from other Christian couples."

Couples had the opportunity to live the powerful gift of the endeavours. *"The Endeavours, particularly the scripture reading and couple prayer, are helpful to us in our marriage, binding us as one through His word. The rule of life provides a true challenge to make a genuine effort for self-improvement and self-reflection."*

We feel blessed. *"Teams have played an important part in our marriage and on our spiritual journey as a couple and as individuals. It is our anchor which helps us to stay focused and to go deeper in our mutual relationship as a couple and in our personal relationship with God."* *"Teams of our Lady has become the backbone of our marriage, knowing the support is always there, the joy of meeting the other couples and sharing the ups and downs, is a true blessing for us from the Lord."*

We thank the movement for embracing us and pray the Holy Spirit to send us new couples, wherever they live.

Dublin Annual Sector Retreat



The principal event in the Sector during the last few months was the Sector's annual retreat for 2022. It had been originally planned to take place during Lent. However, owing to circumstances beyond the control of the Sector Team it was deferred until May.

Taking place on the 7th May, in Avila Retreat Centre, Donnybrook, from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., it was presented by Fr. Liam Finnerty OCD, on the theme of "Marriage in the Divine", with a focus on some of the writings of St. John of the Cross – mainly the *Spiritual Cantic*. Numerous St. John of the Cross quotes throughout added extra depth to Fr Liam's talks.

The retreat was attended by 56 retreatants – representing 40% of the Sector's membership and also representing 14 of the Sector's 16 base teams.

Evaluation sheets were completed by retreatants and have since been analysed by the Sector Team. Apart from the responses indicating appreciation for the day, key messages for the Sector Team for future retreat planning included:

- Longer retreat time,
 - More time for prayer and personal reflection, and
 - More open discussion time.
