"We take a journey through the Eucharist, starting from how we initially place ourselves before this sacrament, then taking as the main nucleus the four verbs of the institution of the Eucharist from the words of Luke's Gospel: take, bless, broke and give. Finally, we reflect on Sunday, the Lord's Day, the parts of the Mass and the fact that Jesus asked us to "Do this" in his memory, thus connecting the Eucharist with our Christian life." 15-20th July 2024: International Meeting of the Teams of Our Lady, Turin, Italy

10,000 delegates are expected to travel to Turin from all over the world for this meeting which takes place every 6 years! Paul and Annette O’Beirne (Super-Regional Couple for the Transatlantic Teams - GB, Ghana, Ireland, Malawi, South Africa, Trinidad & Tobago and Zambia) have advised as follows:

“The conference will begin at noon on Monday 15th July until 20th July 2024 (5 nights). Hotel, meal, and attendance costs are included in the fee of €695pps. The balance will be due in stages and payment will be completed by 30th March 2024. The cost of travel to Turin is additional.”

A new deadline of 1st October 2023 has been set for registrations so that arrangements can be made to offer unallocated places to other countries who have waiting lists. The good news is that there are still just a couple of places available in the Transatlantic Super-Region, so please consider joining. These places will be allocated on a first come- first served basis! If you would like to travel, please make your application asap.”

At time of writing there are 8 couples and 2 spiritual counsellors booked to travel from Ireland. For some it will be a first International Meeting!

If you cannot attend yourself, maybe you can support a couple from your Team or from the wider Movement, at home or abroad, to attend.

A Word from the Regional Chaplain Fr. Richard Sheehy

The 30th August marks the 20th wedding anniversary of friends of mine who were married in Dingle, Kerry. It's easy for me to remember this anniversary, as the very next day I took a flight to Los Angeles to begin the first part of a wonderful sabbatical year. Another set of friends reminded me this week that their 25th wedding anniversary is coming up

in early September. I celebrated their marriage in Wicklow and am now godfather to their eldest son, who is beginning his second year at university.

Wedding anniversaries don't merely mark the passage of time; they celebrate a journey shared, with all its joys and challenges, its sorrows but also fruits; above all the deepening of love and commitment and the acquiring of wisdom. Anniversaries should be marked! Of course the real development in the life of most couples is the arrival of children, where family becomes the main focus, and children teach their parents the demands as well as the blessings of love.

Last weekend marked the 5th anniversary of the visit of Pope Francis to Ireland for the World Meeting of Families. In his homily at Mass in the Pro-Cathedral to mark the anniversary on Sunday 27th August, Archbishop Dermot Farrell noted that '*Pope Francis encourages people of faith to look at families as they are, and not as projections of some idealised world. Every family is a real family. No family is a perfect reality*'. He recalled too that Pope Francis met with three couples in the Pro-Cathedral who were at different points in their journey of marriage. Affirming the fidelity of one couple who were celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary, Pope Francis observed that '*inevitable hurts and misunderstandings often arise from human frailty and thoughtlessness, as well as the scars left by life's losses and regrets*'.

We think especially of the latter as, for the fourth time this summer, families are left mourning the tragic loss of teenage children through a road accident. It is every parent's worst nightmare, and our hearts instinctively go out to the grieving families and friends of those who died. However, it is also in these heartbreak situations, when people reach out in small but meaningful acts of thoughtfulness, solidarity and compassion, that community becomes real and Christ's gospel of love is proclaimed.

In response to the question of a newly married couple about sharing their faith with any children they might have, Pope Francis stressed the '*irreplaceable role of parents and the home in the shaping of values and in handing on the faith*', and he added: '*the bedrock of all is the relationship between the parents themselves, their tenderness, affection, and generosity*'.

When I asked a couple recently why they wished to celebrate their marriage in a church setting, they were very clear that they wished to create space for a third transforming presence in their relationship. They were humble enough to acknowledge that they couldn't hope to rely on their own goodness or good will to sustain a faithful and mutually life-giving relationship but needed also the grace and presence of God.

The grace that Teams of Our Lady offers is to encourage couples to explore and deepen their relationship with God in Christ through the practice of the endeavours and the monthly meeting with the Team, so that it can transform their relationship as a couple and their life as a family. Thinking of the upcoming information Zoom meetings on both Teams (for married couples) on Sunday 24th and Tandem (for engaged couples) on Saturday 16th September, as well as the annual picnic in Malahide castle on Sunday 17th September, we pray that other couples may discover the grace of Teams.



Tribute: Fr. Gerry Cassidy CSsR

Gerry Cassidy was a priest of the Redemptorist Order and a Team, Sector and Regional Chaplain on a number of occasions. In the North he was particularly known for his quiet work in the area of ecumenism. What follows are some reflections on a life well lived.

Margaret Lambe

It must be about forty-three years ago that Fr Gerry first came into our life. It was at an Information Night for Teams and we went on to form Belfast 1. We were eleven people. Then, just over twenty-five years ago, Fr Gerry also became our parish priest in St. Gerard's Parish, Antrim Road. He was now literally on our doorstep and throughout the following years, always on the edge of our family life. It is in this capacity I want to remember him.

He baptised three of our five children, was celebrant at our four family weddings, my mother-in-law's funeral and John's funeral. He is in our First Communion and Confirmation photographs. He was with us when John died. Boxing Day evenings always included a visit from Fr Gerry.

With gentle encouragement from him, our children, at various times, became involved with helping at the parish youth club, altar serving, reading at Mass and the church choir. He was a firm believer in 'planting the seeds of faith' in young people and trusted implicitly that, in God's good time, these seeds would grow and bear fruit.

He was an excellent listener, thoughtful and sensitive and somehow intuitively attuned to what family members needed. After John died, he made a point several times of taking our fourteen year old and her friend, Johnny, for a strenuous clamber to the top of the Cavehill. When another daughter was working in London and he happened to be visiting there - he contacted her and took her out for 'a proper meal'. He allowed our adored cat to nestle on his lap - despite the fur left clinging to his clerical trousers! He would frequently pop in of an evening, usually on his way back to the parish house. His favourite late supper snack with us was oatmeal biscuits with pesto or hummus, olives and ideally a peach or plum. He liked good food and had some little idiosyncrasies - bread had to be white, coffee was black with sugar, he would never eat anything that was red in colour, ice cream made his skin itchy (but he didn't always resist it). He loved apple tart, poached plums, fish and a glass of red wine.

He always had a jigsaw on the go and a book, and was a committed walker which would culminate in a Camino trek every summer. On his return, he would regale us with stories of all the hilarious things that had gone wrong - the soles coming off his shoes, running out of change in a Paris train station and having to beg for what he needed, the night he couldn't find his accommodation, surveying the distance between the sacristy and the altar in his own church the day after he got home and wondering if his legs could manage it - fatigue and post-Camino stiffness were now taking their toll. He had a good singing voice and enjoyed the music-making in our house. He was practical and handy and had his head under our car bonnet on more than one occasion.

I could go on I'm also aware that Fr Gerry would have had similarly close relationships with many, many families in our parish, in Belfast and beyond. He always had an invite somewhere for Christmas Dinner or for a birthday a family celebration or just an evening in or out. He was a people person and people loved him.

We are blessed to have had him in our lives.

Deirdre Kennedy

Fr Gerry Cassidy was a very special family friend and confidante to our children. He responded quickly and with great presence to every request for support. We celebrated special occasions with what the children called a 'Mass Party'.

Gerry would say Mass and we would all eat together afterwards. He was completely at ease in the family setting even once saying Mass with a toddler on his knee! I really appreciated Gerry's spirituality and believe that at its depth was the fact that he knew in a heartfelt manner that God Loved Him. His spirituality was real concrete love of humanity.

Around the Region

Dublin

The next event organised by the Dublin Sector Team is the 2023 Annual Outing. This will be held, like last year, in the grounds of Malahide Castle in north County Dublin, on Sunday, September 17th, from 2pm – meeting on the green in front of the castle. “Geppetto” course – John Paul II Institute

The final sessions of the “Geppetto” course took place from Friday, 30th June to Monday, 3rd July 2023. Meeting in Rome (outside the Institute and beside the Lateran Basilica) on Thursday 29th, a coach had been arranged to bring everyone on the four-hour journey across Italy. The venue was the Sanctuary of Loreto, which is located on the opposite side of Italy to Rome, close to the Adriatic Sea. It was a wonderful place to visit – being the location of the Holy House of Mary.

The weekend was well structured with each day beginning with morning prayer, Mass at mid-day, a number of sessions during the day, free time and lovely food!

Morning prayer was prepared by one of the three Movements each day. On Day 1, *Teams of Our Lady* led the prayer. Sadly, we were not present for most of the first day, arriving in the evening having made our own way across Italy by train – owing to the illness and death of Anne’s brother. So, we missed the Teams prayer – but had contributed to the planning of it beforehand! Prayer on Day 2 was wonderfully and joyfully led by *Amour et Verite* – with the focus being on praising God. On Day 3, prayer was led by *Worldwide Marriage Encounter* – a meditative and reflective period of prayer, with the focus being very much on the couple.

There were three sessions on Day 1 – all of which we missed! The first session presented the mystery of Loreto, including the two different possible explanations for the presence of Our Lady’s House in Loreto, a long way from where it was located when she lived in it! One explanation is that the house was transferred in its entirety by the angels; the second that it was transferred, stone by stone, from the Middle East. There is no dogma around this – you are free to believe whichever appeals most to you! Either way, it was soon housed within a separate stone structure. Years later, it was incorporated as the centrepiece of a large and impressive basilica.

The second session focused on key points of learning (from the whole course) for the couples’ commitment in their Movements and the importance of witnessing, for the renewal of mission. The third session focused on accompanying others in their fragility (drawing from Chapter 8 of *Amoris Laetitia*). While not present for these sessions, one interesting point made was that just as the red sanctuary lamp in every Catholic church is a sign that the Lord is really present in that place, we are all called to be like a sanctuary lamp in the world.

The sessions on Day 2 looked at concrete missionary initiatives in our own Movement (first session) and between our Movements (second session). Some points which came from these sessions included, from a Teams' perspective:

the importance of discipleship within the team, but being missionary outside;
the charism of Teams is not ours – it's a gift to be shared;
Teams is a great place for support and growth, but a link with others is often missing;
the need to recognise that we belong first to the Church and only after that to our Movement;
being in the Movement is only a start – it's not the end;
listening to other Movements can help strengthen the individual Movements;
suggestion that parishes would connect / work with the Movements.

Each of these sessions started with a short input from one of the two course tutors, followed by mixed-movement breakout groups.

The methodology followed in the breakout groups consisted firstly of listening to each other, then echoing the most impactful points of what we had each heard, and finally an exercise in discernment – collecting the key points of what had emerged for presentation to the larger group.

Saturday ended with a torchlight procession in the evening, starting in the basilica and then moving to the square outside.

The breakout groups for the session on Sunday morning were Movement-based with all the couples from each Movement being in a single group. So, the seven Teams couples met as one group. As a group, we were asked to write a short summary statement of what we thought was the challenge facing our Movement (Teams) and this summary was to be passed on the ERI. The statement read as follows:

Our Movement has a specific charism – conjugal spirituality. Based on this, Teams of Our Lady has the challenge to wake couples up to feel the need for formation and deepening their knowledge of the teachings of the Church.

Formed and motivated couples, members of Teams, will be encouraged to go outside and work in their local churches in conjunction with other family movements.

Finally, we (the seven Teams couples) agreed to meet online every few months for a catch-up and a mixed-Teams meeting!

The closing Mass of the course ended with the local bishop offering each couple a blessing and then presenting both spouses with certificates of completion!

The final session after Sunday lunch was devoted to providing feedback and an evaluation of the course.

A trip to the beach followed the evaluation session – with a swim in the Adriatic! This ensured that we had worked up an appetite for a meal in a local fish restaurant, which was also attended by the bishop. The return bus trip to Rome took place the following morning – departing at 9am, with most of the “good-byes” happening four hours later!
